What is Positive Behaviour for Learning?

- PBL is a framework that supports equity and improved learning outcomes for students.
- PBL brings together the school community to contribute to developing a positive, safe and supportive learning culture.

Our school will:

- develop school-wide values and behaviour expectations.
- explicitly teach these expectations to all students.
- acknowledge positive student behaviour.
- consistently and fairly respond to behaviour of concern.
- monitor student outcomes and use data to inform decision making.
- -The PBL framework helps schools teach behaviour and social skills, and respond to behaviours of concern consistently and support students by teaching them what to do instead.
- We will seek input from parents/carers, students and community about what expectations are important to help all children learn and thrive.

What do you need to do?

- -You will receive updates about how we are implementing the PBL framework at our school and the
- outcomes and benefits for your child/children.
- Next term, we will reach out to students, parent/carers and community to hear from you about your values,
- expectations and skills that help your children to learn and be safe at school.
- -We will welcome your feedback and input to help shape our school culture and future direction.

DEVELOPING STUDENT LEADERS

Developing leadership skills is an important part of student learning at Morphett Vale East.

Through leadership roles students learn and develop essential skills such as

- communication
- teamwork
- problem-solving
- building confidence and self esteem
- responsibility
- organisation skills
- initiative

Most importantly it fosters a sense of belonging and encourages students to take pride in their school.

All of these skills connect very strongly with our disposition work – self-esteem, discussion, taking responsibility, collaboration and resilience.

In the early years, students are introduced to leadership through simple classroom roles:

- line leaders
- classroom helpers
- group jobs.

Middle Primary students are offered more structured leadership opportunities:

- · helping organise class events and learning activities
- classroom jobs computer monitor, lunch order monitors
- whole school jobs flag monitors, gate monitors

Upper Primary students are encouraged to take on more significant leadership roles:

- House Captains
 - o supporting and leading a House Team
 - o organising team try outs
 - o supporting the teachers in the running of the events
 - o organising house lunchtime events to encourage team work
- Student Leadership team member
 - Organising lunchtime activities
 - Organising and presenting assemblies
 - Supporting special days and events
 - o Providing feedback to school staff on students' point of view

So far, our Student Leadership team have been involved in organising the end of term casual day fundraising event for a local charity, running regular lunchtime activities and will be working together with other students to develop chants and mascots for our new house teams.
