SMS ABSENCE & LATE NOTIFICATIONS


Please utilize our sms system to advise the reason for your student's absence/lateness. This is just a quick SMS reply our message but keeps your child's records correct.

PREMIERS BE ACTIVE CHALLENGE






After a year of hard work and dedication, our choir students took to the stage and delivered a beautiful performance! Their teamwork, confidence, and passion for music truly stood out.




Wally (ie) The Wasp

I can recognise when I need help and recognise when I'm feeling uncomfortable and need to say no.



LEARNING IN ROOM 7


Phonics: we have been learning about phonemes and graphemes.

This term we have been writing and reading words with the ch, th, wh, ai, ay, ee digraphs.




Science: Living and nonliving.
